




Hard to count communities

- Immigrants
- People of color

- Rural households
- Low-income households
- People experiencing homelessness



Priority Hard to Count Populations



TIER 1 TIER 2 TIER 3 POPULATION OF COLOR (PoC) IMMIGRANT POPULATION (IP) UNDER 18 POPULATION (<18)

1.2 Million households are at risk not participating if we don't engage them early in understanding the importance of the Census to their everyday life.

This is about 24% of the total number of households in PA.



One-on-One Engagement (Civic Engagement)





Ways groups are engaging

- Field mobilization (community events, door, mail, phone, text)
- Educate and mobilize organization's membership
- Recruit other organizations to join the effort
- Create a pipeline for Census Bureau hiring
- Advocate for public and private resources



Get Out the Count plan

2019 - Spring of 2020

- Establish target measures of engagement
- Implement a coordinated communications plan
- Conduct community education and trainings
- Build coalition members' civic engagement capacities
- Execute a targeted field operation using multilayered conversations of door, phone, mail, text and community events to reach the 1.2 million households least likely to respond to the Census

Philadelphia - Currently staffed

Montgomery, Erie - Early 2019



National Landscape

Strong coalition of stakeholders and funders working collaboratively

Focus on national needs with some attention to priority states (PA is not one of them)



Opportunities and Challenges ahead

- 1. Expand the coalition to engage more nonprofits who work in hard to count communities
- 2. Create a public funds for counties and nonprofits to engage in.
- 3. All coalition partners and the Get out the Count plan are funded to do the work
- 4. Uncertainty around the Untested Citizenship question
